My interest for maps and mapping is a long standing interest. In the 1960's when my family was driving in car in Norway or abroad, I early had the responsibility for reading the map and searching the direction. I also participated in orienteering competitions representing my local club "Lyn" in Oslo. With "open eyes" for art I early discovered the fascination for antique maps and their design. After getting experience with them and the market I also thought they were undervalued compared to many other antique items. Antique maps and atlases will always be an important part of the selection offered by Galleri Bygdøy Allé – Kunstantikvariat PAMA.

During 30 years in business the company has been an important supplier to several private collectors as well as to museums and public libraries. Among our highly valued clients are institutions like The Norwegian National Library and the National Museum of Norway. Even the National Library of Australia has filled in important gaps in their collection after buying from us!

Among the large number of private collectors I have been in contact with the last 30 years I will use the opportunity to mention William (Bill) Ginsberg from New York. In the 1980's he started to collect antique maps of Norway and Scandinavia. His first purchases were three maps of Norway from the antiquarian book dealer Claes Nyegaard in Oslo. Bill's passion, knowledge and not at least his collecting strategy has been of greatest inspiration for me. The omission was sort of completed when DNB Sparebankstiftelsen decided to buy Bill's collection in 2017. The most comprehensive collection in the world of maps of Norway and Scandinavia is now in the Map Centre of the Norwegian National Library. Honestly I am pretty proud that several of the items now on display in the National Library have previously been presented and sold through catalogues by Galleri Bygdøy Allé – PAMA AS.

We hope in the future that we will still contribute to assist and supply new and old clients, private collectors and institutions with interesting material. Perhaps the Anniversary catalogue 50 Part I and II will inspire you to start collecting?



1. CLAUDIUS PTOLEMY

ROME 1478 or 1490

Early Ptolemy map of Germany and Denmark.

It is probably not possible to distinguish the 1578 and the 1490 edition.

The «Quarta Europa» is one of the traditional 27 Ptolemy maps. Before the Ulm edition 1482, this map depicting Germany and Denmark represented the outermost northern point of the world. The Scandinavian peninsula is shown through two islands east of Jutland.

A very good copy in strong impression and wide margins. Two mountain chains are coloured (old) as well as the three small islands west of Jutland.

2. MARTIN WALDSEEMÜLLER

"TABULA MODERNA NORBEGIE ET GOTTIE"

STRASBOURG 1513

EXCELLENT EXAMPLE WITH WIDE MARGINS. FROM ONE OF THE MOST FAMOUS 16th CENTURY EARLY ATLASES.

This fine map of Scandinavia comes from one of the most important atlases in the history of cartography. It was published by Johannes Schott and compiled by Martin Waldseemüller who made the first world map to include America in 1507. The 1513 atlas was the sixth edition of Ptolemy's Geographia but Waldseemüller's ground-breaking contribution was to add a supplement of twenty new modern maps in addition to the traditional Ptolemy set. The map of Scandinavia is similar to the Ulm map from 1482 – 86. There are two printings only, the 1513 and a reprint in 1520 where the side text were omitted.

Wide margin copy. Some restorations mainly marginal, upper and lower left part mostly affected. A few restorations within the printed surface.



STRASBOURG (1532) - 1536

THE IMPORTANT BOOK WITH EXTENSIVE DESCRIPTIONS OF PALESTINE, SCANDINAVIA AND THE NORTH. IN A UNIQUE BINDING.

First published in 1532 this second and last edition is dated four years later. The two editions are basically the same, but the book was given a new title in 1536.

The humanist and theologian Jacob Ziegler was born in Bavaria and spent much of his time travelling around in Europe. In the 1520s he lived in Rome, here he was influenced by religious people and theologians from many countries, many escaping from their home country because

of the reformation. Among the people he met are the four Scandinavian church officials: Erik Walkendorf, Archbishop of Trondheim; Olav Engelbrektsson, Archbishop of Uppsala; Johannes Magnus and his brother Olaus. Apparently they gave him valuable geographical and topographical information about the North and the people who lived here. The main part of the book and seven maps of eight describing Palestine with corrections and additions to earlier sources like Ptolemy and the Bible.

The rest of the book is devoted to Scandinavia and the North. The book is published prior to the Reformation (1532 – 36) and is the most comprehensive text of Scandinavia with use of contemporary sources before Olaus Magnus (1555). Map eight "Octava Tabula Continet Cheronnesum Schondiam, Regna autem potasium, Norduegiam, Sueciam, Gothiam, Finlandiam, Gentem Lapones" is a key map in the history of cartography of the North. The map sets a new standard after the Ulm map 1482. For the first time the axis of Scandinavia is running north – south. The peninsula of Finland is not only distinctly depicted by Ziegler but the name Finland ("Finlandia") is for the first time being introduced on a printed map. In the text Ziegler gives an account of Greenland and the Scandinavian settlements. The American continent is melted together with Greenland and the name "Terra Bacallaos" – Land of Codfish on the southern part represents Newfoundland.


Map number eight of the Northern regions is identical in both editions.

The map sets a new standard after the Ulm map 1482 and is a key map in the history of cartography of the North. For the first time the axis of Scandinavia is running north – south. The peninsula of Finland is not only distinctly depicted by Ziegler but the name Finland ("Finlandia") is for the first time being introduced on a printed map. The American continent is melted together with Greenland and the name "Terra Bacallaos" – Land of Codfish on the southern part represents Newfoundland.

The individual map number eight of the Northern regions in the Ziegler work is identical in both 1532 and 1536 edition.

Elegant uncommon map of Scandinavia based on Jacob Ziegler (1532) and his mapping of the North. Giacomo Gastaldi is one of the most famous representatives among several cartographers in Venice mid-1500. His edition of Ptolemy's "Geographia" contained sixty maps, the most extensive to date. The atlas was never republished and the individual map of Scandinaiva is difficult to obtain.

The handsome woodcut map based on «Carta Marina» 1539 was published twice in the works of the brothers, Johannes and Olaus Magnus. This first issue was published in «Historia de omnibus gothorum sueonumque regibus» by Johannes Magnus. One year later in 1555, Olaus Magnus used the same woodblock but changed the text above in his «Description of the Northern Peoples.

In both works the map is part of the pagination. Individual copies of the map is not often seen.

7. GIROLAMO RUSCELLI

This extraordinary map in the history of cartography is based on the so-called "Zeno map", a woodcut map from 1558 which was included in a few copies of the book "De i commentari..." written by C.M. Zeno. On this map the mythical island "Frislandt" south of Iceland was depicted for the first time. Only a handful of copies of the original Zeno woodcut map is known making this Ruscelli edition the first obtainable. It was copied by Ruscelli for his Ptolemy edition in Italian 1561 and later. The Ruscelli publication gave credibility to the description of the area, and "Frislandt" was drawn on most maps of the North the next century. If we compare the original "Zenomap" from 1558 with the Ruscelli edition the latter does not connect Greenland to the peninsula of Scandinavia.

A PROTOTYPE MAP OF SCANDINAVIA AND THE ATLANTIC. The copperplate for this map was in use for more than forty years but with some alterations.

When Abraham Ortelius for the very first time in May 1570 published his atlas "Theatrum Orbis Terrarum" in Latin, neither Ortelius nor the publisher knew how many copies would sell. Supposedly 40 copies were printed and sold out immediately. During the same year three more issues were printed making in total four "First editions" (1570 A – D). Several of the maps are both recto and verso identical in all four issues. However it is possible to distinguish the A of a loose map of the north from B – D. The typesetting verso on the map is slightly different from B – D. The last three can not be distinguished from the Latin 1571.




The chart comes from part II of the «Spieghel der Zeevaerdt» published by Christoffel Plantijn.



Sea chart of Jutland in Denmark.

In 1584 – 85 L.J. Waghenaer published in Dutch his book with charts. Towards the end of the 1580s England and Queen Elisabeth was at war with Spain, the so-called "Anglo-Spanish War 1585 – 1604". The big threat for the British was the "Spanish Armada", the impressive Spanish fleet. To be prepared for a major sea battle, Lord Chancellor, Sir Christopher Hatton commissioned through the clerk to the Privy Council, Anthony Ashley an English translation of Waghenaer's pilot book with the Latin edition from 1586 as a model. The elegant charts were engraved by Jodocus Hondius who was brought from Holland. The English sea charts by Waghenaer became so popular that the expression "Waggooners" became synonymous with charts in general. Remainings from framer's mount verso, a very good copy.

13. GERARD MERCATOR (RUPELMONDE 1512 - DUISBURG 1594)

FIRST ISSUE OF THE FIRST EDITION MAP WITH THE FOUR ISLANDS IN THE POLAR SEA. IN ORIGINAL COLOURS. PUBLISHED IN ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT ATLASES IN THE HISTORY OF CARTOGRAPHY.

Famous circular polar map, also depicting Scandinavia and parts of America, a northwest passage, Russia, and a potential northeast passage. Three corners with circular maps of Shetland, Faero Islands and the imaginary island "Frislant" south of Iceland.

Gerard Mercator is together with C. Ptolemy probably the most important name in the history of cartography. His name is still in use with the "Mercator's projection". Mercator was educated as cartographer, mathematician and globemaker and worked on his own after 1537. In 1552 he moved to Duisburg where he made some of his most famous maps: Europe (1554), the British Isles (1564) and the World (1569), his eighteen-sheet masterpiece in which he introduced the new projection. He had not completed his planned project of an extensive cosmography at the time of his death in 1594. His son Rumold completed the work the following year and published the maps posthumously under the title "Atlas", the first time this word was used as a title for a book of maps. This work consisting of 107 maps (102 maps of Europe and five maps of the World and the four continents) is unquestionably one of the most important atlases in the history of cartography.

16. PETRUS PLANCIUS (1552 - 1622)

AN IMPORTANT MAP OF THE NORTHERN NAVIGATION COMPILED BY A KEY FIGURE IN DUTCH EXPLORATION AND MAP MAKING AROUND 1600.

Petrus Plancius was a Dutch theologian, astronomer, cartographer, clergyman and businessman. At age 24 he became a minister in the Dutch Reformed Church, and during the Inquisition he fled from Brussels to Amsterdam. There he became interested in navigation and cartography and was one of the founders of the Dutch East India Company. From the 1590s, Plancius's influence gave him access to maps recently brought from Portugal. Careful study of these manuscripts convinced him of the existence of an alternative route to India and Cathay (China) through a Northeast Passage. The map or the chart of Europe was a part of the project to find and sail through such a route, and it helped to convince the Sponsors and the Authorities in the Netherlands to organize expeditions to the Far East via North Norway and Russia.

The elegantly designed chart was first published in 1594 by the publisher Cornelis Claesz in co-operation with Petrus Plancius. It included valuable new information about the northwest sailing routes acquired from the English voyages of Martin Frobisher and John Davis. However the most important feature of Plancius's map is the enlarged map of Novaya Zemlya and the northern coast of Russia in the upper right corner. In the inset – and unlike on the main map - Novaya Zemlya is drawn as two islands separated by a strait. Judging by the many English names in the Arctic region his sources are obviously based on the English explorers. Plancius's theory about Novaya Zemlya as two islands made it more difficult for him to accept Gerard Mercator's depiction of the four polar islands (see our entry 13).

In making this map Petrus Plancius wanted to create interest in and knowledge of his idea about a potential northeast route. It is very interesting to read the text line under the inset map saying that an expedition had been sent out to this region in July 1594. This text is assumed to be the oldest printed reference to the first polar voyage undertaken by the Dutch and Willem Barentsz and it is the more remarkable for having been published before the expedition's return to Holland.

The map is in very good condition. Only a small restored tear upper right. Parts of left blank margin extended but not affecting the printed surface. 



The first two expeditions are somewhat of an introduction to the spectacular third expedition, resulting in the epic wintering on Novaya Zemblya. De Veer's account is by far the most important source for this episode of the Dutch history of exploration. Thanks to him we know exactly what happened in the winter of 1596-97. Also, without de Veer's account, Willem Barentsz, the hero of the wintering drama, would have remained a more obscure figure...Little is known about De Veer. He must have been relatively young at the time, between 20 and 30.»


Gerrit de Veer's account starts with a short summary of the two first voyages 1594 – 1595. As he did not take part in the first, he must probably got the information from Willem Barentsz. The third voyage is taken far the major part of the book and is written in the form of a «day-to-day diary» description.

THE IMPORTANCE OF THE PUBLISHER CORNELIS CLAESZ

Until c. 1600 there was no tradition in the Netherlands to publish travel journals, even though important sea travels took place. Barent Langenes in Middelburg and Cornelis Claesz in Amsterdam would change all that with books published in 1597 and 1598 describing voyages to the Far East. Printed journals of voyages to the north followed almost immediatly.

«Cornelis Claesz became a driving force behind publications in the field of cartography, description of foreign lands, seaborne navigation and books on the outcome of Dutch voyages of discoveries and trade missions into all parts of the globe» (Günter Schilder in «Monumenta Cartographica Neerlandici» VII)

It is generally belived that the 1598 Dutch edition of Gerrit De Veers's journal by Cornelis Claesz preceded the Latin and the French edition from the same year. The Dutch edition was published in the unusual oblong quarto format, (this format was first introduced by Langenes in Middelburg for «Houtman Journal» 1597), but Claesz used the more convential folio format for the Latin and French editions. However the new format was apparently so popular that it became the standard for 17th century Dutch journals. The copperplates and the illustrations were the same for all three 1598 editions by Claesz, and the two main maps are signed by Baptista van Doetechum.

The oblong 4to, Dutch 1598 edition is «rare to the point of no existing», (a phrase used only a few times by the Oslo antiquarian book dealer Claes Nyegaard when cataloguing exceptionally rare books). There are a few copies held in institutions and libraries, but no copy can be traced in sales records from the last several decades. An incomplete copy was sold in Oslo at auction in 1969 (Jonas Skougaard Sale).



As we already have seen this very rare and much sought after map is based on information by the Dutch map maker and explorer Willem Barentsz and his three voyages to the north 1594, 95 and 96/97. The track of the last journey is shown on the map. Among the papers the surviving crew brought with them back to Holland was a sketch and a manuscript of a North Polar map drawn by Barentsz. It was copper engraved by Van Deutecum and published separately in 1598 by Cornelis Claesz or included in a few copies of Linschoten's "Navigatio ac Itinerarium...". Linschoten accompanied Barentsz on parts of his two first voyages.



There is not much information to find either about the author of the map, Johannes Strubius nor the map itself. However the German historian in cartography Peter H. Meurer (1951 - 2020) had a six-pages article some years ago about the history of this map and its background, "Die stumme Karte der Alten Welt von Johannes Strubius". In German Meurer uses the name "Stumme Karten" (Silence maps). Outline engraved maps with names meant to be filled in.


Meurer and his research explains how the map was created and published. Intended for use in schools and to teach people in cartography, two versions were published along with a sheet of text. There are two versions known, one with (B) and one without (A) topographical names. According to Meurer both states are printed from the same copper plate. (A) is the first known "Stumme Karte" in the world of cartography. Today there is supposedly no copies known of (A), Meurer lists four institutional copies of (B) but none in private hands.



IVAN BENDIKSEN

A DEDICATED COLLECTOR OF SEA CHARTS OF NORWAY

Ivan was born in 1941and raised in the northern Norwegian city of Harstad. Growing up on the coast, with the sea as his playground, his connection to all things maritime became an integral part of his life.

His father was the warehouse manager at a local shipyard, who also collected maritime artifacts, a hobby he shared with Ivan. During school holidays he often sailed with his grandfather, a navigator on a coastal freighter, giving him an early familiarity with the Norwegian coastline and its landmarks.

Ivans first career choice was to become a naval architect, which combined his interest in design and graphics with his maritime background. But after a year of study in Newcastle, he changed course and moved back to Norway to study psychology.

But Ivans maritime connections remained solidly intact. He became an avid sailor and even designed and built a little sailboat for himself.

After his studies ,and some years working in Sweden, he settled in Tønsberg. He started a family, worked as a psychologist, and soon after bought a classic wooden sailboat which he and his family sailed for many years. He was also actively involved in the local sailing milieu in Tønsberg.

It was on a trip to the US in 1998 that Ivan bought his first antique map. He was visiting friends in Philadelphia and happened to wander into the Philadelphia Print Shop where he saw a collection of antique maps. A map of Norway and Sweden by H.Moll caught his attention. He was fascinated to see this antique presentation of the area he knew so well, so he bought the map and his interest in antique maps was ignited.

It was not long after that he sought out Pål Sagen, whose knowlegde was invaluable to him as his map collection grew. Discussing these maps with Pål always gave him such pleasure, a contact that was maintained for the remainder og his life.

For Ivan, the craftmanship, aesthetics and history of these antique maps of Norway and environs, brought together so much of what defined him.

Ivan died in 2011. His family is now ready to sell this collection so that others can marvel, appreciate and enjoy these beautiful maps as much as he did.



The map of Norway is a small size map from a simple book "Caert Thresor", and we can easily imagine that most loose copies must be lost. The country is shown as far north as Steigen. Our example has French text on the back and above the map, this is the edition published by Cornelis Claesz in Leiden. According to Ginsberg there are five printings of the map only: This French text edition 1602, a Latin (1602 - 03), further a 1609 French issue, one without any text above the map or on the back, (only one copy of this variant is known which is inserted in a German 1612 atlas edition), and the last rare 1649 Latin edition by Visscher. The first four issues are classified as "State 1" and the 1649 "State 2".

Age-toned and browning. A closed marginal tear upper left. A decorative copy in appealing colours of the period. Very few copies of Langenes's atlases were coloured at the time of publication.







The business was continued by his son, Gerard van Keulen, and their descendants until c. 1800.

Ivan Bendiksen's passion for sailing and sea charts made it "necessary" for him to acquire what is probably the most representative set of sea charts of Norway from "The Golden Age of Dutch Map Making". The framed set decorated the family's living room for many years. The eight charts are showing the sailing routes from Gothenburg to Vardø and are illustrated with typical merchants scenes from every region mapped.

The cartobibliography of Van Keulen's eight charts is somewhat complicated and even perhaps confusing. But thanks to Ginsberg's enormous effort to organize the charts in a chronological order, we have since 2012 been able to date the individual charts far more precisely. It might exist until 4 different printing states of each chart due to alterations made on the copper plates. The set from the collection of Ivan Bendiksen seems to have been published in one of the great sea atlases +/- 1750.

The Van Keulen sea chart publishing company was in the line of a Dutch tradition from Waghenaer and Blaeu in making sea charts and pilot books. The maps were used on board in practical sailing but were also purchased for decorative purposes as works of art.
